# New Parish Hall Project Update!



The Planning permission was granted by the Council on 23rd April. The tender was submitted to four contractors on 22nd April. All contractors prior to the issue of the tender confirmed that they were interested in taking part in the exercise. The return date of 20th May 2024 was agreed. During the process we received the usual tender gueries, and one contractor undertook a site visit. On the return date we received one tender from Integra Buildings at £785K. The other three tenders later confirmed that they were not submitting a tender all siting that they could not achieve a budget of below £500K. However, last week, The Paragon Space another tender submitted their quote at £679K. Nevertheless, our hope is that we shall be able to bring the figure down to around £600K, which we believe is achievable without any significant effect to the size and specification" of the design of a new hall. Having come this far, we are very keen to see this project through to completion. On the basis that the building can be delivered for a total cost of £600k, we have managed to secure these grants: Bernard Sunley Foundation £50k (Secured), Joseph Rank Trust £50k (secured), Poor Mission Fund £100k (request archdiocese for additional £50K), Albert Gubay Foundation £300k (£50K Request - Granted totally their grant to £350K). Shortfall of £50K. I will keep you updated with development.

Perhaps now we need to double our fundraising effort, because we have been asked to raise more funds to fill the gap. And I hope you will generously support our Summer Car Boot Sale and Fun Faire event coming up on Sunday July 21st starting 10:00am or so, till 3pm.

### 14th Sunday Year B Readings: Ezekiel 2:2-5; Ps. 122; 2 Cor. 12:7-10; Mk 6:1-6 "A Thorn in the Flesh"

The poet William Cowper wrote: "God moves in mysterious ways his wonders to perform." But God's mysterious way seems to be a 'scandalous' or paradoxical way, for he often chooses what is weak, ordinary and painful to make known his presence among men. Ezekiel was a frustrated prophet who in his frustration often scolded and attacked the exiles for their infidelities. But when he received word of the fall of Jerusalem, he offered the exiles a new message of hope. Because of God's presence in his painful frustration, he rose to the occasion despite his weakness.

Jesus was rejected by his own people in his hometown (Mk 6:2). And yet Jesus demonstrated 'od's strength in the very midst of denial and rejection unto Calvary. St Paul was at pained when he heard the unjust attacks of his opponents. In addition, he had to carry all his life "a thorn in his flesh" (2Cor 12:7). But he asserted that "When I am weak, then I am strong" (V.10). All these three great prophets proclaim one simple truth, namely whatever be the weakness or pain or thorn we have to carry in our lives, every thorn is the symbol of the powerful presence of the dynamic presence of God.

'A thorn in the flesh' could be a physical illness. We have many examples of people who have endured such 'thorn in the flesh' through a life changing injury. We know with help of many especially from the families and friends, they walked through it to the end, discovering the love of God through those who helped.

Thorn in the flesh' could take the form of rejection by others. some are rejected because of colour, race, or nationality but when they keep on loving others, they soon see the dynamic presence of God in their rejected condition and win acceptance, love, even admiration. Some are rejected early in life as useless for the future. Bishop F Sheen, was a great preacher, but was told by his college debate coach, "You are absolutely the worse speaker I ever heard." And there are many others, like him, you know been rejected for various reasons, but went ahead to achieve more than expected, including St John Vianney. Such people were not disheartened by rejection, rather they continued to believe in their own worth and persevered in their efforts and God brought out of these rejected individuals the best they could offer to the world. Even our Genuine love will soon possess the supreme happiness of life which is the conviction that we are loved.

Thorn in the flesh' could mean also the ordinary, routine, humdrum things in life. There is a human temptation in all of us to fail to see God in the ordinary things in life and instead to seek him in the unusual or exciting phenomenon. Often the longing to touch the presence of God sends us searching for visions and apparitions in faraway or near places, while his guaranteed presence is in the ordinary. Because we instinctively admire strength and expect to find it in our athletes, political leaders, and celebrities, because we live in a society that give great value to great deeds, weakness is something that we are less able to cope with and our being ordinary and fragile tends to leave us frustrated or depressed.

At such moments we must recall that the joy of life depends not so much on what we do, but on what God does through us. And God would never permit any evil if he could not bring good out of evil. He has in himself all power to protect us, all wisdom to direct us, all mercy to save us and all happiness to crown us.
