Our readings teach us about the importance of following God's commands, acting on His word, and understanding true purity. These reflections will help us dive deeper into these teachings and apply them to our lives.

In the First Reading, Moses speaks to the Israelites, urging them to follow God's laws. He emphasises that by doing so, they will show wisdom and understanding. This wisdom will set them apart from other nations and bring them closer to God. God's laws are not just rules. They are a guide for living a good and holy life. When we follow them, we receive many blessings and experience God's closeness. We should take Moses' message to heart. By obeying God's laws, we show our love and respect for Him. This obedience also brings peace and order to our lives.

St James in the Second Reading reminds us that all good things come from God. He is unchanging and always gives us what we need. We must embrace His word and act on it. Hearing God's word is not enough. We must put it into action. True faith is shown by our deeds, especially in caring for those in need. James also teaches that pure religion means helping the vulnerable and keeping ourselves pure. This shows our commitment to God and His teachings. By acting on His word, we live out our faith every day.

In the Gospel, St Mark tells us about a time when Jesus was challenged by the Pharisees. They were focused on external rituals, like washing hands, rather than the heart. Jesus explained that true purity comes from within. Our thoughts and actions show our true selves. Evil thoughts and actions come from within and defile us. Jesus teaches that what matters most is our inner purity. We should focus on our hearts and minds, not just external practices. By keeping our thoughts and actions pure, we live in a way that honours God. This inner purity is what truly pleases Him.

Let us pray. Lord, help us to obey Your laws, act on Your word, and keep our hearts pure. Guide us in showing our faith through our actions. Amen.

**SEPTEMBER** is traditionally the month dedicated to Our Lady of Sorrows. The Memorial of Our Lady of Sorrows is kept on September 15<sup>th</sup>. The day before, September 14<sup>th</sup>, is the Feast of the Triumph of the Cross. Like many of the lesser-known Marian feasts, the Memorial of Our Lady of Sorrows is tied to an event in the life of her Son. On September 14, we celebrate the instrument of Christ's victory over death; and the next day, we remember the suffering of Mary as she stood at the foot of the Cross and witnessed the torture and death of her Son. We are also reminded of Simeon's words to Mary (Luke 2:34-35) at the Presentation of the Lord—that a sword would pierce her soul. Through these prayers for September, we can unite ourselves to Mary in her sorrow, in the hope that we will one day also share her joy in the triumph of her Son.

**NEW BEGINNINGS:** September is a time of new beginnings for many people. A new academic year will begin for all involved in education, so we pray for pupils and staff, and all those who work and support the life of our schools. We pray also for those starting at University and moving away from home. We also pray for Douglas Grantham and Filip Gronaiewicz who commence their formation as Seminarians for the Archdiocese of Birmingham at the Royal English College, Valladolid.

**THE SEASON OF CREATION** begins on September 1<sup>st</sup> and continues to October 4<sup>th</sup>, the feast of St. Francis of Assisi. This is the Ecumenical celebration we hold each year, instituted by Pope Francis back in 2015. The theme for 2024 is 'to hope and act with creation'. St Paul in his letter to the Romans, pictures earth as Mother, groaning as in childbirth, and St Francis understood this when he referred to the Earth as our sister and our mother in his Canticle of Creatures. The times we live in show that we are not relating to the earth as a gift from our Creator but rather as a resource to be used. Our unsustainable actions harm the earth, causing the climate crisis, loss of biodiversity, human suffering as well as Creation's suffering.

**WORLD WEEK FOR PEACE IN PALESTINE AND ISRAEL** takes place from 16<sup>th</sup> – 22<sup>nd</sup> September. During this week, there will be two Holy Hours held in SJW (17<sup>th</sup> September) and STM (19<sup>th</sup> September) where we can come together to pray for peace in these areas of conflict. Each year the World Council of Churches invites us to join together to work for a just peace for all in Palestine and Israel. We are encouraged to educate ourselves and others, to pray and to take action for justice. The focus is Gaza, and the theme is 'Whatever you did ... you did for me.' **AN EXHIBITION OF THE SHROUD OF TURIN** is coming to St Patrick's, Deedmore Road, Coventry, CV2 2HW. Visitors will be able to see a full-sized replica of the Shroud of Turin as part of a fascinating exhibition which will be on display from 1<sup>st</sup> - 15<sup>th</sup> September. The Shroud is a linen cloth that bears a faint image of the front and back of a crucified man. Many believe it is the burial shroud used to wrap the body of Jesus after his crucifixion, and upon which his bodily image is miraculously imprinted. The exhibition will also feature other displays and detailed information boards, which cover evidence revealed by historical and scientific research, explaining how the Shroud's image and bloodstains align with Gospel accounts. The exhibition will be open on Tuesdays to Fridays 5.00pm – 7.00pm, Saturdays from 12noon – 4.00pm and after Sunday Mass, from about 11.30pm – 1.00pm.

**NEWMAN CIRCLE** will hold their Annual Mass and Social on 10<sup>th</sup> September at 12 noon and a Circle Talk on Tuesday 24<sup>th</sup> September at 7.30p.m. Veronica Whitty will speak on: 'Estelle White, Composer and Hymn Writer' in the MRR at STM.

**QUARANT'ORE EUCHARISTIC FESTIVAL** at St Thomas More Church from Thursday 3<sup>rd</sup> – Sunday 6<sup>th</sup> October 2024. Following the positive feedback and comments last year and to link in with the Adoremus National Eucharistic Festival taking place later this month at Oscott College, we shall be holding another Quarant'ore Festival at STM.

Quarant'ore is a tradition which is believed to have begun in Italy during the 16<sup>th</sup> century in honour of the forty hours during which the Body of Our Lord rested in the tomb. The Forty Hours Devotion invites us to watch before the Lord, and in this extended period of adoration to offer, in his presence, our prayer for the Church and its mission.

Over the coming weeks there will be sign-up sheets for people to volunteer for this. During the forty hours, there must be two people present in church to ensure the safety of the Blessed Sacrament. Others, if not signed up, are welcome to come and spend time with the Lord. The Quarant'ore will also be interspersed with 'themed' Holy Hours, Morning and Evening Prayer and the Holy Rosary. It will also be possible to buy votive candles for intentions that will be placed around the Blessed Sacrament for the Forty Hours.

**SIDE CHAPEL DOOR** at STM will be open to access the Side Chapel for private prayer during the day. It will usually be open from around 9.30am – 5.00pm, except on Monday's.

**ANSWERPHONE MESSAGES:** A few people have said they have phoned the Presbytery but did not receive a call back. Lola – the cat – hasn't been trained to answer the phone yet, so if you do call, and get no answer, please make use of the answerphone facility so your call can then be returned at the earliest convenience.

**ADORATION OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT** is a wonderful opportunity for us to be still and quiet in the presence of the Lord. In both STM and SJW there is a weekly opportunity for this. St Alphonsus Liguori once wrote, 'know also that you will probably gain more by praying fifteen minutes before the Blessed Sacrament than by all the other spiritual exercises of the day. True, Our Lord hears our prayers anywhere, for He has made the promise, 'Ask, and you shall receive,' but He has revealed to His servants that those who visit Him in the Blessed Sacrament will obtain a more abundant measure of grace.' Adoration takes place on Friday mornings at STM and Saturday mornings at SJW.

**ADOREMUS NATIONAL EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS** will take place Oscott College on Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> September 2024. It has been scheduled to coincide with the 53<sup>rd</sup> International Eucharistic Congress in Quito, Ecuador. Although this is not a public event, we are encouraged to spend time before the Blessed Sacrament on this day, uniting in prayer before the Lord. Please consider coming along to our usual slots of Adoration on Saturday morning at SJW and Saturday evening at STM on this day.
