27th Sunday Year B

Readings: Genesis 2:18-24; Ps. 127; Hebrews 2:9-11; Mark 10:2-16

'Two - become one!'

- one in heart, one in hope, one in love, one in God. The inseparability of wife and husband in marriage is the ideal that the Roman Catholic Church has sought to maintain over the centuries. That fact is, however, that divorce is everywhere on the increase and among Catholics almost as much as in other denominations. Happy and successful marriages are built on the ideal of fidelity, which means that people must be true to themselves, to friends, to their chosen spouses, and above all to God. Without fidelity to God there is serious danger of infidelity in marriage. And the contrary is also true: when people are faithful to God, to themselves, and to friends, the problem of fidelity in marriage greatly diminishes.

Marriage is a true vocation, which means that God calls a woman and man to become holy in and through a loyal living out of every aspect of marriage. Most people are married or will be married in the near future. (We need to be reminded that the single life as a layperson is also a true, God-given vocation. So, too the life of widows and widowers). Most marriages are reasonably happy, though none are free from problem or from suffering, worry, and pain. In marriage as in all vocations, growing and maturing is the deepest need. And both spouses have to work at the maturing. They have to learn the true meaning of love: that it is living for the beloved rather than for the self. Both have to learn the needs of the other partner, both physical and psychological (the needs of children, too). Every person needs to be loved and cherished, to be told that she or he is loved, and it can't be too often. In a word, spouses have to communicate. One might speculate that most failures in marriage can be traced to failure to communicate as mature, adult, equal human persons. Marriage is for mature persons who are capable of taking on responsibility for the other as well as for themselves. How to create a happy marriage? Ann Landers gave some excellent suggestions for creating a happy married life. She says: 1. Never both be angry at once. 2. Never yell at each other unless the home is on fire. 3. Never meet without an affectionate welcome. 4. Yield to the wishes of the other as an exercise of self-discipline if you can't think of a better reason. 5. If you have any criticism, make it lovingly. 6. Neglect the whole world rather than each other. 7. Never bring up a mistake of the past. 8. Don't be afraid to give compliments to the other. 9. Never go to bed mad. 10. When you've made a mistake, talk it out and ask for forgiveness. 11. Remember, it takes two to make an argument. The one who is wrong is the one who will be doing the most talking.

A word to those not yet married. We cannot insist too much on the need for thorough preparation. It has been said that people spend many years preparing for a profession, but when it comes to preparing for the most important profession of all, the vocation of marriage, they think they can do it in a few weeks or months. Essential to the preparation is finding out what the future spouse thinks about the meaning of life, about religion, about the life to come. What are his/her priorities and values? Are the future spouses capable of heroic love? Can they talk together and argue without raising their voices? What values do each of them have? What is really important to each? Happy, successful marriages do not happen all at once. Like genuine love they have to be made, created, build, often at the cost of great effort and sacrifice. Creating this love is a mutual growth process that must continue all through life.

A final warning: marriage break down when the spouse lose sight of one another and begin to live only for themselves, when they refuse to remember the almost divine dignity of the human person and use or treat one another only as objects or as personal property. May Jesus, who worked his first miracle at a wedding feast, help all married couples by his word, his example, and his sacrificial love to grow and mature together into the fullness of love. Because of that oneness, Jesus says, "Let no man separate what God has joined."
