

THE WORD OF THE LORD

The theme of today's readings: Journeying together

First reading Baruch 5:1-9

This reading sets the theme of our readings. First, it describes the promised joyful return of the Jewish exiles of the Babylonian captivity to Jerusalem in the 6th century BC. Then, the passage looks beyond that historic return to the journey of redeemed humanity to the heavenly New Jerusalem of Christ the King.



Psalm 126 is one of the so-called "Songs of Ascent" that pilgrims sang on the journey up the Judean mountains to the holy city of Jerusalem to celebrate the annual feasts and worship in the Jerusalem Temple. In the hymn, the pilgrims remember the joyful journey of the returning exiles to Jerusalem after the Babylonian captivity. However, this "Song of Ascent" can also be seen as the symbolic anticipation of all the righteous as they continue their earthly journeys with the hope that they may one day ascend to worship in the heavenly New Jerusalem which Jesus has prepared for his redeemed people.

Second reading Philippians 1:4-6,8-11

St. Paul prays for the Christian community at Philippi. He writes to praise them for their growth in charity, characterised by their love in action. Such works, he tells them, are a supernatural virtue that includes wisdom in discerning the will of God that leads them to attain a better knowledge of God and, thereby, a greater union with him.

Gospel Luke 3:1-6

We learn that St. John the Baptist is the mysterious, unidentified prophetic voice from Isaiah's prophecy in the 8th century BC. His is the voice that announced the coming of God among his people in Jesus's First Advent and the all-encompassing change his arrival will have on the world. Nothing will stand in his way to hinder his coming or message, and all humanity will see the salvation of God. We are called during Advent to respond anew to St. John's prophetic voice; to confess and repent of those sins that separate us from God; to make straight our paths on the journey of salvation.

ADVENT: A PENITENTIAL SEASON?

Strictly speaking, Advent is no longer considered by the Church to be a penitential season, even though it looks like one - no Gloria, purple vestments etc. Why? I have absolutely no idea!! Nowadays the Church speaks of Advent being "a period of devout and expectant delight". But what is the cause of our delight? What is "the reason for the season" (of Christmas)? Why do we look forward to Christ's second coming with confidence? Because in the first coming of Christ, God and sinners are reconciled. Christmas proclaims: We are sinners; we need a Saviour; and his name is Jesus Christ, born of Mary. The Incarnation and the Birth of Jesus Christ happened for our salvation. Therefore it seems entirely fitting that the season of Advent include a grappling with sin and conversion ie have a penitential character. I think St. John the Baptist would agree and encourage us to pick up some of the Church's traditional penitential practices in the run-up to Christmas, recognising that they can help us to grow in our life in Christ. Confession ought to be part of our preparations anyway (the Church does still insist on that), but so might additional fasting, prayer and almsgiving be. Let's prepare our hearts to celebrate the Birth of Christ in the ways Catholics have always valued, and by a bit of Advent discipline put to death everything that hinders Christ's coming to us today. Fr Paul.

FOUNDATIONS OF FAITH

The first of our 2025 monthly evenings of teaching on the foundations of our faith will take place on Wednesday 29th January, 7.00-8.30pm, in the parish room. This is open to all, with an emphasis on communicating the Church's teaching on the basics of our Faith. Our first session will be on Creation and the Fall.

Saint Paul was very aware of the persistent danger in the Church of false teaching and of the thirst for novelties in doctrine, and so addressed the young bishop, Timothy:

I charge you in the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and by his appearing and his kingdom: preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, and exhort, with complete patience and teaching. For the time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander off into myths. As for you, always be sober-minded, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, fulfil your ministry. 2Timothy 4:1-5

The aim of these sessions is to help us know and defend the Sacred Traditions of the Church, the sound doctrine which we need in order to understand the Word of God. The Sacred Traditions of the Church are the basis of the New Testament, without which we have no anchor to keep us from floating away in a sea of inventions that are brought about by those who prefer their own ideas than those of Jesus Christ.
