Welcome to Mass today. We extend a special welcome to anybody joining us for the first time. Please introduce yourself, and if you are able, stay for refreshments after the Mass.

The Fourth Sunday of Advent brings us closer to the birth of Jesus and invites us to reflect on important themes. Through the readings from Micah, Hebrews and Luke, we learn about God's promise, the importance of humble beginnings, obedience to God's will, and recognizing Jesus in our lives.

Our Gospel reminds us to be always looking for signs of God's presence in our lives. The Visitation, where Mary visits Elizabeth, is full of joy. Elizabeth recognizes Jesus when her baby, John, leaps in her womb. This moment shows us the importance of being open to God's presence in everyday moments.

Elizabeth could have dismissed her baby's movement as just another kick. Instead, she saw it as a sign of something bigger. She recognized it as a moment of grace and the closeness of redemption. This teaches us to see God's hand in small, everyday events.

Jesus came to us as a baby in Bethlehem, but He also comes to us in our daily lives. If we only see Him in the nativity scene, we miss many moments of grace. We need to be ready to encounter Him in our interactions with each other. Through prayer and the sacraments, we prepare ourselves to recognize and welcome Jesus every day.

Let us pray. Lord, help us to see Your presence in our daily lives. Guide us to be humble and obedient to Your will. May we recognize and welcome Jesus in every moment. Amen.

THE MASSES OF CHRISTMAS, many years ago, were called by different titles and their liturgies were especially designed to emphasise a distinct part of the Christmas story. Each mass includes ancient antiphons, a special symbolism of light, and highlights the glory of this most holy of events.

The First Mass is the Midnight Mass or the Angel's Mass. This Mass celebrates, traditionally, the hour that Christ was born and is the one with longest history. The Gospel in this Mass comes from Luke 2: 1-14. It centres around the announcement of the angels, in glory, to the shepherds in the field, and is a very joyful mass. The darkness of midnight is meant to be a symbolic reminder of the lack of true light in humanity before Jesus was born.

In the Second Mass, known as the Mass at Dawn or the Shepherd's Mass, Luke's Gospel continues (Luke 2:15-20). It narrates the shepherds hastily going to meet the newborn Messiah and glorifying the Lord for this miracle. This Mass is typically focused on the introduction of light with Jesus's birth and invites us to proclaim the Good News of Christ's birth just as the shepherds did.

The Third Mass is the Mass of the Day or the King's Mass. The liturgy now turns to the Gospel of John 1:1-18. This reading not only highlights the imagery of light once again in the birth of Christ (echoed from the previous Masses), but also focuses on the mystery of the Incarnation of the King of Kings.

TURKEY LEFTOVERS: If you find you still have leftovers from the Christmas lunch – don't panic, Christmas isn't over on 25th December. Christmas is just too important a celebration to limit to a single day, and so we are asked to celebrate the Christmas Octave. We spend four weeks of Advent preparing for the Christ child to be born, and therefore have the Christmas Octave to celebrate the good news. Why not consider coming along?

CHRISTMAS CRIB APPEAL this year will be in aid of Friends of the Holy Land (FHL). Though Christmas celebrations may be cancelled in Bethlehem, our brothers and sisters there share our hope in Christ, which is very much alive. With your help, we can ensure that hope shines brightly through the remarkable Christians who continue to serve so bravely. Any donations can be left in the baskets by our cribs in church. Thank you for your generous support.

DID YOU KNOW? From 1558 until 1829, Roman Catholics in England were not permitted to practice their faith openly. Someone during that era wrote a carol as a catechism song for young Catholics. It has two levels of meaning: the surface meaning plus a hidden meaning known only to members of the Church. Each element in the carol has a code word for a religious reality which the children could remember. The "True Love" one hears in the song is not a smitten boy or girlfriend but Jesus Christ, because truly Love was born on Christmas Day. The partridge in the pear tree also represents Him because that bird is willing to sacrifice its life, if necessary, to protect its young by feigning injury to draw away predators. The two turtle doves were the Old and New Testaments. Three French hens stood for faith, hope, and love. The four calling birds were the four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. Five golden rings represented the first five books of the Old Testament, which describe man's fall into sin and the great love of God in sending a Saviour. The six geese a-laying stood for the six days of creation. Seven swans a-swimming represented the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit - Prophesy, Serving, Teaching, Exhortation, Contribution, Leadership, and Mercy. The eight maids a-milking were the eight beatitudes. Nine ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit. The ten lords a-leaping were the Ten Commandments. The eleven pipers piping stood for the eleven faithful Apostles and the twelve drummers drumming symbolized the twelve points of belief in The Apostles' Creed.

KNITTED BABY CARDIGANS are required by the University Hospital for premature babies. If you, or any friends can knit any, they can be given in at church, so that the Knights of St Columba will pass them to the Coventry Clothing Charity.

LOURDES PILGRIMAGE with the Archdiocese will take place from Saturday 24th – Friday 30th May 2025. There has been a great tradition of parishioners from both STM and SJW joining this pilgrimage, so please do make a note in your diary. More information will be available earlier in the New Year.

HOUSE VISITS to the sick and housebound are an important part of the life of the church. Any parishioners who would welcome a visit, are asked to contact Fr Simon, Deacon Leo or Deacon David so a visit can then be arranged.

GOING INTO HOSPITAL: Anyone going into hospital, needs to be sure to tell the ward staff they are a Catholic and would like to see the Catholic Chaplain. Please also notify the Parish Clergy, so a visit, either by them or the Chaplain can be arranged.

YEAR OF JUBILEE: Pope Francis has declared that 2025 will be a year of Jubilee. The theme is 'Pilgrims of Hope' and is a year of hope for a world suffering the impacts of war, the ongoing effects of COVID-19 pandemic, and a climate crisis. The Jubilee Year is a time to reestablish a proper relationship with God, with one another, and with all of creation. the concept of Jubilee or 'Holy Year' was used to declare special years for forgiveness and reconciliation. The Year will run from the opening of the Holy Door in St Peter's Basilica in Rome, on Tuesday 24 December 2024 to the Feast of Epiphany 2026.

JUBILEE COMPANION BOOKLETS will be available in the coming weeks. The Companion Booklet is designed to help us ponder and pray, focusing on the great themes of the Holy Year: hope and forgiveness, the Apostles Peter and Paul and their Basilicas in Rome, and the key places of prayer and repentance. It also includes numerous articles on being a Jubilee pilgrim, the Jubilee Icon, reflections, prayers and hymns.

Preferred dates cannot be guaranteed—someone else might have asked for a particular day before you, but the nearest date will be offered.

12 DAYS OF A CLIMATE-CONSCIOUS CHRISTMAS

A Partridge in a - more environmentally friendly- Christmas tree: According to the Carbon Trust, real Christmas trees actually have a smaller carbon footprint than artificial trees, provided they are properly disposed of. This means planting it in your garden, having it chipped by your council or using Treecycle. You could also rent a tree that is replanted each year, use your old tree as a wildlife hotel in your garden or even look into ways to donate your tree to coastal erosion management schemes!

Two Turtle-ly Awesome Doves ways to reuse Christmas cards Have a huge pile of Christmas cards destined for the recycling bin? Here are 2 ways to reuse them instead: Cut them up and make some new cards or gift tags to use next year. Get really creative and make some Christmas decorations out of your old cards (e.g. your own nativity scene, stars, tree decorations)

Three French Hens that have travelled from France sustainably: Are you travelling to see family or friends this Christmas time? Or are you pushing the boat out and going on holiday? Here are some ways to make your transport more eco-friendly: walk or cycle, use public transport where possible (enjoy reading a book or watching our favourite film on the way), offset your carbon footprint if you do need to fly.

Four Birds Calling Out Poor Food Practice: The amount of poultry thrown away each year in UK homes is enough to make 800 million Boxing Day curries (UK Gov, 2019). During the Christmas season: only buy what you'll eat. Eat up your leftovers. Buy local produce to reduce food miles. Buy food without packaging, where possible. Donate to your local food bank.

Five Gold Ring lights (or other assorted Christmas lights): Christmas lights give a real festive feeling but as well as the cost of turning them on, they also carry environmental impacts. Consider setting them on timers to reduce the time they're on for and make sure they're all more efficient LEDs. While you're at it, why don't you check if all the lights in your home are energy- efficient too. Google the Energy Saving Trust for more information.

Six Geese-a-laying the foundations for the future: "To suppose that all problems in the future will be able to be solved by new technical interventions is a form of homicidal pragmatism, like pushing a snowball down a hill," - Pope Francis, 2015 In 2015, Pope Francis warned against placing too much hope in carbon capture technologies. We need to act now to make real change.

Seven Swans a swimming in plastic-free waters: Consider how you can make your Christmas plastic-free. You could: wrap presents without using Sellotape; buy unpackaged food buy presents with minimal packaging or make handmade decorations instead of buying plastic ones.

Eight Maids-a-milking Christmas presents a little bit too much: Do you love giving and/or receiving presents? Do you try to find an excuse to buy everyone under the sun a little something? Take a moment to reconsider whether every present is necessary. Also investigate some more planet-friendly options like ethical gifts, charity donations and reusable presents that won't end up in landfill.

Nine ladies dancing because of climate progress: Christmas is a time for rejoicing. And in that spirit here are some examples of progress this year: In September, the UK became the first G7 country to abandon coal power Glasgow is trialling eco-friendly electric wallpaper to heat its ageing homes. 6 European countries (including the UK) pledged €130 million to protect biodiversity.

Ten lords-a-leaping into action: Instead, or as well as giving presents this Christmas, think about how you can give your time to charities. You could volunteer for your local food bank, a charity shop, your local wildlife trust or any other charity of your choice to make a difference in your local community.

Eleven Pipers Piping up on climate injustice: How can you speak up for climate justice in 2025? Join marches, lobby your MP, sign petitions, talk to friends, family and colleagues. But remember, first do some research so you know what to say!

Twelve Drummers Drumming Banging on about their New Years' Resolution: New year, new opportunity for new climate-friendly habits. Take some time to consider what you can do in 2025 to make an impact on the planet. For example, you could monitor how much plastic you use, try to eat seasonal foods or make your resolution to learn more and read some climate news/fiction every month!

FIRST READING Micah 5: 2 – 5a

Thus says the Lord: You, O Bethlehem Ephrathah, who are too little to be among the clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to be ruler in Israel, whose coming forth is from of old, from ancient days. Therefore he shall give them up until the time when she who is in labour has given birth; then the rest of his brothers shall return to the people of Israel. And he shall stand and shepherd his flock in the strength of the Lord, in the majesty of the name of the Lord his God. And they shall dwell secure, for now he shall be great to the ends of the earth. And he shall be their peace.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

R: Bring us back, O God; let your face shine forth, and we shall be saved.

O shepherd of Israel, hear us, enthroned on the cherubim, shine forth. Rouse up your might and come to save us. *R*
