THE WORD OF THE LORD

Theme of today's readings: The Divine Bridegroom and the Bride

First reading *Isaiah 62:1-5* When the chosen people of Israel are in covenant union with God, Scripture often expresses the wholeness of that relationship as a marriage covenant between God the Bridegroom and the covenant people as his beloved Bride. However, when the people apostatise from their vows of faithfulness to the covenant, the once pure Bride falls into the sin of adultery and becomes an unfaithful spouse. Despite the covenant people's failures, God's love for his Bride (his covenant people) never ceases. He is always willing to reclaim his chosen people as his Bride. The Fathers of the Church saw this passage as a prophecy of the wedding banquet of the Lamb and his Bride, the Church, and the prophesied "new name" of "the Bride of Christ" (Revelation 2:17;3:12).

Psalm 96 is one of a group of psalms celebrating the kingship of God by inviting the peoples of the earth to give glory to God in a new song and join in praising him by invoking his name in worship. God welcomes them to bring their offerings and acknowledge that he is the divine King of all nations, dispensing justice with equity, bringing blessings, and keeping his promises.

Second reading *I Corinthians 12:4-11* St. Paul reminds us that God loves us and gives his Spirit of love to all the members of his Church family. At the same time, God recognises that we are all different and reveals his response to our differences in the various kinds of gifts of the Holy Spirit that he gives us. To make his point, St. Paul names nine types of spiritual gifts. Even though these are "manifestations", the same God produces those works in us to advance the Church.

Gospel John 2:1-11 St. John the Baptist announced that Jesus is the divine Bridegroom (John 3:29). When Jesus began his ministry, it is significant that his first public sign took place at a wedding where he changed water into wine. His miracle prepared us to participate in his royal wedding feast as he neared the climax of his mission at the Last Supper. In the parable of the Wedding Feast (Matthew 21:1-14) and the announcement of his New Covenant at the Last Supper (Matthew 26:27-28; Luke 22:19-20), Jesus calls all the faithful of humanity to become betrothed to him. Through the power of the Holy Spirit in the Sacrament of Baptism, we are reborn to become "one flesh" with him in the Sacrament of the Eucharist (Ephesians 5:21-33; 2Corinthians 11:2). Through the Sacrament of Baptism, Jesus, our divine Bridegroom, offers the gift of universal salvation.

FOUNDATIONS OF FAITH

The first of our monthly evenings of teaching on the foundations of our faith is on **Wednesday 29th January**, 7.00-8.30pm, in the parish room. The first session will be on **Creation and the Fall**. The aim is to help us know and defend the Sacred Traditions of the Church, the sound doctrine which we need in order to understand the Word of God. The Sacred Traditions of the Church are the basis of the New Testament, without which we have no anchor to keep us from floating away in a sea of inventions that are brought about by those who prefer their own ideas than those of Jesus Christ.

JUBILEE YEAR 2025 'MOMENTS OF GREATER INTENSITY'

The first Jubilee was celebrated in 1300 AD at the initiative of Pope Boniface VIII. They are celebrated every 25 years in the Church though the pope may mark 'extraordinary jubilees' outside of that - and bear the hallmarks of the ancient spirit of jubilee. In the tradition of the Church, a Jubilee is proclaimed by a Papal Bull of Indiction. The Bull for Jubilee 2025 is titled *Spes non confundit* or 'Hope does not disappoint/put us to shame' (Rom 5:5). Pope Francis notes that, as a pilgrim people, we need 'moments of greater intensity to encourage and sustain hope as the constant companion that guides our steps' (*Spes non confundit* §5). The present Jubilee offers those moments of 'greater intensity', opportunities to reorient, refresh, and renew our relationship with the Lord and with our neighbours.

The language of 'greater intensity' is helpful because it suggests that a Jubilee Year is about **returning to the basics of our faith and the Christian life to rediscover their power and vitality**, rather than scrambling around for new things to do. There may well be new things that need to be done, as the Spirit leads us, but not instead of the basics: **Prayer**, every day. **Bible reading**, every day. Attendance at the **Eucharist**, every Sunday and Holyday of obligation. Regular reception of Holy Communion. Confession, at least once a year, and as needed. **Fasting.** Almsgiving. Works of mercy. Supporting the life and mission of the Church. Let's resolve to give our attention to the basics this Jubilee Year, the foundations of our life in Christ. Fr Paul

Romans 5:1-15 Since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. Through him we have also obtained access by faith into this grace in which we stand, and we rejoice in hope of the glory of God. Not only that, but we rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us.
