Readings: 1 Sam.26:2,7-9, 12-13, 22-23; Ps. 103; 1 Cor. 15:45-49; Lk 6: 27-38

Compassionate Love

The bishop was troubled in the early morning by a loud disturbance outside his house and by knocking at his door. When he opens the door of his humble house he sees, held by the strong arms of three policemen, the wretched figure of a man. The man has been arrested for stealing silver plates from the table of the bishop. He was caught while running away from the small town. The silver plates and two silver candlesticks were the only items of value in the bishop's possession.

The captive is an ex-convict, treated with disdain and contempt as he journeyed from village to village. He was refused food and board at the local inns and eventually found himself at the house of the bishop. The kind old bishop gladly fed him and gave him a bed for the night. However, in the middle of the night the exconvict's old ways overtook him and he fled into the early light with the bishop's silver plates. Now, as he stands before the bishop, he sees the madness of his act but also the inevitability of life again as a prisoner. The bishop smiles, looks straight at the man and says, "But you forgot the candlesticks I gave to you also." The police are taken aback, and the man is staggered by this turn of events. Going to the mantelpiece the bishop gets the candlesticks and hands them to the unbelieving man. The police are dismissed and the ex-convict, Jean by name, is left with the bishop. The bishop speaks to him, saying, Jean: "Today I have bought your soul for God, use this treasure to become an honest man."

The above story is not new, many might have read the story from Victor Hugo's novel, Les Misérables, also immortalised in the West End musical. The Bishop of Digne represents the compassion of God. He focuses his attention towards the needy and the poor and in serving them. He tries to answer the call of Jesus to live a life of compassion. "Be compassionate as your heavenly Father is compassionate." But compassion is not simply the putting of pious words together into meaningful prayers for those who suffer. It is not simply a feeling of concern. It is, above all, acting on behalf of people living in poverty, those suffering through ill health and those needing emotional support.

As we approach the season of Lent, we would do well to examine our understanding of perfection and holiness. Is perfection the striving after some ideal moral state of innocence or is it the reaching out in all circumstances to those who are in need? Is holiness a solitary endeavour concerned with my own purity and salvation or is it generous enough to embrace those who are despised and rejected in an embrace of love? In short, are we compassionate as our heavenly Father is compassionate? Victor Hugo wondered where the saintly bishop learned to be so different from the people around him. His only answer: "from the Gospel." Let us pray that we may also learn how to be compassionate by reflecting upon and living out the Good News of Jesus Christ.
