Welcome to Mass today. We extend a special welcome to anybody joining us for the first time. Please introduce yourself, and if you are able, stay for refreshments after the Mass.

This Sunday, Jesus teaches about humility and self-examination. In our Gospel, He tells us to look at our own faults before judging others. This practice leads to true humility and helps us grow closer to God.

We often judge people based on their appearance, wealth, or status. But what really matters is the condition of their hearts. Our conversations reveal our true beliefs and values. What we say shows what is inside us. Our words can impact our relationships deeply. When we speak with love and humility, we build others up. But if we are proud and critical, we can harm relationships. We must be aware of our own weaknesses and strive to improve.

Pride blinds us to our own faults. We become hypocrites, thinking we are better than others. This pride is a barrier to holiness and prevents us from leading others to Christ. Self-examination helps us recognize our own sins and grow in humility. Let's focus on removing the log from our own eye. Let's strive for humility and seek to improve ourselves before judging others. By doing so, we can follow Christ more closely and help others on their spiritual journey.

Let us pray. Lord, help us to speak with kindness and truth. Give us hope in Christ's victory over death. Teach us to be humble and see our own faults. Guide us to live faithfully and love others as You love us. Amen.

**THE MONTH OF MARCH** is dedicated to St Joseph. We don't know much about him except what is mentioned in the Gospels. Joseph was the husband of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the foster-father of Jesus. Holy Scripture proclaims him as a 'just man,' and the Church has turned to Joseph for his patronage and protection. St John Paul II said, 'because St Joseph is the protector of the Church, he is the guardian of the Eucharist and the Christian family. Therefore, we must turn to St Joseph today to ward off attacks upon the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist and upon the family. We must plead with St Joseph to guard the Eucharistic Lord and the Christian family during this time of peril.'

Blessed Joseph, husband of Mary, be with us this day. You protected and cherished the Virgin; loving the Child Jesus as your Son, you rescued Him from the danger of death. Defend the Church, the household of God, purchased by the Blood of Christ. Guardian of the Holy Family, be with us in our trials. May your prayers obtain for us the strength to flee from error and wrestle with the powers of corruption so that in life we may grow in holiness and in death rejoice in the crown of victory. Amen.

**THE FORTY DAYS OF LENT** are a gift that the Church in her wisdom celebrates every year. It is a gift of time, of contemplation, and of quiet. It encourages us to turn away from the noise and over-indulged appetites so that we may understand the hunger that can be filled—with the grace of God—only by prayer, fasting, and giving to the poor. Very often, when the season is over, people look back and say, 'I had a terrible Lent' and its simply because we don't truly prepare or allow ourselves to enter fully into the season. This year there are several extra things happening, so let's take full advantage of them and enter fully into the season.

**EARLY BIRD MASSES** on Tuesday mornings at 6.45pm in the Side Chapel at STM. These will be followed by a light breakfast in the MRR.

**STM STATIONS OF THE CROSS:** On Sunday 9<sup>th</sup> March at 6.30pm, the new Stations will be unveiled, blessed and meditated on for the first time. The rite of solemnly erecting the Stations of the Cross is a liturgy rarely seen, as new Stations are seldom hung. It is, however, a most important rite that elevates the status of the Stations in a church from being mere images, to powerful spiritual aids.

**STATIONS OF THE CROSS** will be prayed at SJW on Tuesday mornings after the 10.00am Mass and at STM after the 11.00am Wednesday Mass and on Friday evenings at 6.30pm.

**LENTEN SOUP LUNCHES** will be held on Wednesdays at 12noon in the MRR and after the 12noon Mass at SJW on a Friday. During Lent, there will be an opportunity to give a small donation at the lunches, which will be added to the parish charity collection (Mary's Meals).

**PARISH CHARITY:** At the start of Lent, we will be starting our support for a particular charity. The charity for the coming year will be Mary's Meals. The money taken at refreshments after our Saturday and Sunday Masses, together with a voluntary collection once a year, and other small donations will be donated to their work and outreach.

**MARY'S MEALS** is a charity which grew out of another charity called Scottish International Relief (SIR), which was set up after Magnus MacFarlane-Barrow and his brother Fergus took aid from their home in Argyll, Scotland, to Medjugorje, Bosnia-Herzegovina, during the conflict in 1992.

Over the next ten years, SIR expanded. It began building homes for abandoned children in Romania, helped returning refugees in Liberia by setting up mobile clinics, and continued to deliver material aid to Croatia and Bosnia-Herzegovina as well as funding many additional projects.

The Mary's Meals campaign was born in 2002 when Magnus visited Malawi during a famine and met a mother dying from AIDS. When Magnus asked her eldest son Edward what his dreams were in life, he replied simply: "I want to have enough food to eat and to go to school one day." That moment was a key part of the inspiration which led to the founding of Mary's Meals, which began by feeding just 200 children in Malawi in 2002. The charity is named in honour of Mary, the mother of Jesus, who brought up her own child in poverty.

Please remember that preferred dates cannot be guaranteed—someone else might have asked for a particular day before you, but the nearest date will be offered.
