# Welcome to Mass today. We extend a special welcome to anybody joining us for the first time. Please introduce yourself, and if you are able, stay for refreshments after the Mass.

Our readings invite us to reflect on God's presence among us, the importance of love and faith in times of betrayal, and the need to support one another in our faith journeys. These themes remind us of the central messages of Christianity: God's closeness, the call to love, and the strength found in community. God being close to us means He is involved in our daily lives. He is not distant or far away but is always near, offering comfort and guidance. This presence can be a source of strength and hope, especially during difficult times.

In the reading from Acts, Paul and Barnabas encourage the early Church to remain strong in their faith. They show us the importance of community and support. In the face of hardships, they continue to spread the Gospel, teaching us that faith and perseverance go hand in hand. The Book of Revelation offers hope with the vision of a new heaven and a new earth. It reminds us that God is with us, wiping away our tears and promising a future free of pain and suffering. This vision encourages us to hold on to our faith, knowing that God is always near to us. Finally, in our Gospel, Jesus' new commandment to love one another as He has loved us is a powerful message for this Sunday in Easter. Despite knowing He would be betrayed, Jesus focuses on love and service. His example teaches us to love others even in difficult times and to trust in God's plan.

Reflecting on these readings, we learn the importance of staying strong in our faith, supporting one another, and focusing on love and service. This reminds us that, even in the face of challenges and betrayal, our faith and love for others should remain unwavering.

Let us pray. Almighty Father, thank You for Your constant presence in our lives. Help us to love one another as Jesus taught us. Give us the strength to support each other in our faith journeys and to trust in Your plan. Amen.

**REGINA COELI:** One of the most joyous anthems of the Church is the Regina Coeli, the Easter hymn to Our Lady. In a fearful pestilence our Lady's portrait reputedly painted by St. Luke was being carried in a procession which included Pope St. Gregory the Great. As they approached St. Peter's Basilica, the air became pure and free of pestilence. At the bridge which joins Rome to the Vatican, angels were heard singing the first three verses from the Regina Coeli and St Gregory was inspired to add the fourth line 'pray for to us to God, alleluia.' This prayer reminds us, of how much we have to be thankful for, even in the midst of our daily trials. When our Lord conquered death in His resurrection, he opened the gates of Heaven for us to be able to share Eternal Life with Him.

O Queen of Heaven, rejoice, alleluia. For He whom you did merit to bear, alleluia. Has risen, as he said, alleluia. Pray for us to God, alleluia.



Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary, alleluia. For the Lord has truly risen, alleluia.

O God, who gave joy to the world through the resurrection of Thy Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, grant we beseech Thee, that through the intercession of the Virgin Mary, His Mother, we may obtain the joys of everlasting life. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

**THE MONTH OF MAY** is dedicated to Our Blessed Lady. The custom of dedicating the month of May to Mary dates back to the 13th century. But it might come as a surprise to know that it wasn't until the 18th century when this practice became popular. The practice became common among the members of the Jesuit Order in Rome. Because of the far reach of the order's schools, the devotion took hold, and by the 1700's it began to spread worldwide. It's a Catholic tradition to honour Mary during the month of May by crowning her statue with flowers. The reason why we crown Mary is best summed up by Pope Paul VI who wrote in 1965 that May is an occasion for a "moving tribute of faith and love which Catholics in every part of the world pay to the Queen of Heaven." The crown symbol is attributed to Mary because she is the Mother of the Son of God, our Heavenly King.

# 'Annuntio vobis gaudium magnum: Habemus Papam!' 'I announce to you a great joy: we have a Pope!'

# Pope Leo XIV



Cardinal Robert Prevost became the 267th Pope on Thursday 8th May. He appeared on the balcony of St. Peter's Basilica and was introduced to the world as Leo XIV.

He was born on September 14<sup>th</sup> 1955, in Chicago, Illinois, to Louis Marius Prevost, of French and Italian descent, and Mildred Martínez, of Spanish descent. He has two brothers, Louis Martín and John Joseph.

He studied first at the Minor Seminary of the Augustinian Fathers and then at Villanova University in Pennsylvania, where in 1977 he earned a Degree in Mathematics and also studied Philosophy.

On September 1st 1977 he entered the novitiate of the Order of Saint Augustine (O.S.A.) in Saint Louis, in the Province of Our Lady of Good Counsel of Chicago and made his first profession on September 2<sup>nd</sup> 1978. On August 29th, 1981, he made his solemn vows. He received his theological education at the Catholic Theological Union in Chicago. At the age of 27, he was sent by his superiors to Rome to study Canon Law at the Pontifical University of Saint Thomas Aquinas (Angelicum). In Rome, he was ordained a priest on June 19th, 1982, at the Augustinian College of Saint Monica.

The first Augustinian Pope, Robert Prevost – now Leo XIV – is the second Roman Pontiff from the Americas after Pope Francis. However, unlike Jorge Mario Bergoglio, the 69-year-old Robert Francis Prevost is from the northern part of the American continent, though he spent many years as a missionary in Peru before being elected head of the Augustinians for two consecutive terms.

There has already been, and will continue to be, much speculation on how the papacy of Leo XIV will unfold. We are encouraged to remind ourselves and others, that this is not the successor of Pope Francis, but of St Peter himself and our first and foremost duty is to pray for him; praying that the same Holy Spirit that inspired the Cardinals to elect him, will continue to work in and through him as the Supreme Pontiff of the Catholic Church.

PRAYER FOR POPE LEO XIV: O God, who in your providential design willed that your Church be built upon blessed Peter, whom you set over the other Apostles, look with favour, we pray, on Leo our Pope and grant that he, whom you have made Peter's successor, may be for your people a visible source and foundation of unity in faith and of communion. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

## READINGS FOR THE FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

## **FIRST READING**

Acts 14:21b-27

In those days: Paul and Barnabas returned to Lystra and to Iconium and to Antioch, strengthening the souls of the disciples, encouraging them to continue in the faith, and saying that through many tribulations we must enter the kingdom of God. And when they had appointed elders for them in every church, with prayer and fasting they committed them to the Lord in whom they had believed. Then they passed through Pisidia and came to Pamphylia. And when they had spoken the word in Perga, they went down to Attalia, and from there they sailed to Antioch, where they had been commended to the grace of God for the work that they had fulfilled. And when they arrived and gathered the church together, they declared all that God had done with them, and how he had opened a door of faith to the Gentiles.
