Welcome to Mass today. We extend a special welcome to anybody joining us for the first time. Please introduce yourself, and if you are able, stay for refreshments after the Mass.

Every Mass is a commemoration of Jesus' Last Supper and a proclamation and participation in this mystery. Because we can sometimes get lost in the routine each Sunday, the feast of Corpus Christi helps us focus once again on what we are called to do at Mass. We are called to celebrate what we believe: we express our faith in the risen Christ, who gave his life for us out of love. To live what we believe: we give witness to the risen Christ by our way of life and to become what we receive: we become Christlike, so that others might see in us and in what we do the one who gave his life for us.

In the 13th Century there was a great strengthening and renewal of the Eucharist in the hearts of Christians, and today's feast of Corpus Christi was one of its fruits. Traditionally it was celebrated on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday, but here, of late, it is celebrated on the Sunday following. Today's feast reminds us of the wonderful gift that is the Eucharist – that the Lord Jesus truly becomes present in the bread and wine which becomes his body and blood. In the Eucharist our Lord becomes both our divine food, and the sacrifice we offer.

Our 5.00pm Mass will conclude with a time of Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament and our 9.00am and 11.00am Masses with a short Corpus Christi Procession. The prayers for the conclusion of Mass can be found on the back on this newsletter.

One way we can increase our reverence for the Blessed Sacrament is by paying attention to how we receive and consume our Lord during Holy Communion. Receiving on the tongue or in the hand, whether standing or kneeling, are permitted by the Church; and whichever we choose, we should make sure we are doing so with the highest degree of care, humility and awe. The early Church Fathers advised Christians to think of their hands as a throne on which the King of the Universe could be humbly received. St. John Damascene taught to put one's hands in the form of a cross. At some point in the early Church, some felt that they could show greater respect for the Eucharist by receiving on the tongue, and it became universal in the West by the year 900.

On this day, we pray that the heart of Jesus, in the Most Blessed Sacrament, will be praised, adored, and loved with grateful affection, at every moment, in all the tabernacles of the world, even to the end of time. Amen.

'BE STILL AND KNOW THAT I AM GOD!' Many of us enjoy coming to church for a number of reasons. Not only do we get a chance to be closer to God, but we also get to see some of our friends, people that we have known perhaps for a long time, which gives us a chance to catch up on what is going on in each other's lives. Today's world is starved of silence and Holy Mass should be a privileged moment to escape the hustle and bustle of daily life and, through worship and participation in Christ's eternal sacrifice, become capable of giving an eternal value to these same daily and transitory activities.

Before Mass there should be a general atmosphere of silence. This does not exclude a quiet word of greeting, a nod of recognition or a friendly handshake among the parishioners. What should be avoided is the steadily rising hum of multiple conversations in the pews, often interrupted only by the announcement that the celebration is about to begin.

Pope Francis frequently emphasised the importance of silence, particularly before Mass, as a way to prepare the heart and mind for prayer and deeper listening to God's word. He highlighted silence as a space where one can make room for Christ and discern the Father's will, leading to more authentic communication with God.

MASS INTENTIONS: The Mass is the greatest prayer we can offer as Catholics since it is the 'source and summit' of the Christian Life. An individual may ask a priest to offer a Mass for several reasons: for example, in thanksgiving, for the intentions of another person or as is most common, for the repose of the soul of someone who has died. Mass offering envelopes are available at the back of both churches. Please fill in the required information and hand it to Fr Simon or push through the Presbytery letterbox. We ask that Masses be booked three months in advance of your required date. Please remember that preferred dates cannot be guaranteed—someone else might have asked for a particular day before you, but the nearest date will be offered.

CORPUS CHRISTI PROCESSION CONCLUDING WITH BENEDICTION OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT

Be still, for the presence of the Lord, the Holy One, is here; come bow before him now with reverence and fear: in him no sin is found, we stand on holy ground.

Be still, for the presence of the Lord, the Holy One, is here.

Be still, for the glory of the Lord is shining all around; He burns with holy fire, with splendour he is crowned: how awesome is the sight – our radiant King of light! Be still, for the glory of the Lord is shining all around.

Be still, for the power of the Lord is moving in this place; He comes to cleanse and heal, to minister his grace, no work too hard for him. In faith receive from him. Be still, for the power of the Lord is moving in this place. Tantum ergo Sacramentum, veneremur cernui: et antiquum documentum, novo cedat ritui: præstet fides supplementum, sensuum defectui.

Genitori, genitoque, laus et jubilatio, salus, honor, virtus quoque, sit et benedictio: procedenti ab utroque, compar sit laudatio. Amen

Panem de caelo praestitísti eis.

Omne delectaméntum in se habéntem.

The procession forms and all are asked to follow on afterwards whilst joining in the hymns:

This is my body, broken for you, bringing you wholeness, making you free. Take it and eat it, and when you do, do it in love for me.

This is my blood poured out for you, bringing forgiveness, making you free. Take it and drink it, and when you do, do it in love for me.

Back to my Father soon I shall go. Do not forget me; then you will see. I am still with you, and you will know you're very close to me.

Filled with my Spirit, how you will grow! You are my branches; I am the tree. If you are faithful, others will know you are alive in me.

Love one another – I have loved you, and I have shown you how to be free; serve one another, and when you do, do it in love for me.

Sweet Sacrament divine, hid in thine earthly home, lo, round thy lowly shrine, with suppliant hearts we come;

Jesus, to thee our voice we raise in songs of love and heartfelt praise: sweet Sacrament divine.

Sweet Sacrament of peace, dear home for every heart, where restless yearnings cease and sorrows all depart; there in thine ear all trustfully we tell our tale of misery: sweet Sacrament of peace.

Sweet Sacrament of rest, ark from the ocean's roar, within thy shelter blest soon may we reach the shore; save us, for still the tempest raves, save, lest we sink beneath the waves: sweet Sacrament of rest.

Sweet Sacrament divine, earth's light and jubilee, in thy far depths doth shine thy Godhead's majesty; sweet light, so shine on us, we pray, that earthly joys may fade away: sweet Sacrament divine.

And he blessed Abram and said, 'Blessed be Abram by God Most High, Possessor of heaven and earth; and blessed be God Most High, who has delivered your enemies into your hand!' And Abram gave him a tenth of everything.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

Ps 110

R: You are a priest for ever, according to the order of Melchizedek. The Lord's revelation to my lord:

'Sit at my right hand, until I make your foes your footstool.'

The Lord will send from Sion your sceptre of power: rule in the midst of your foes.

With you is princely rule on the day of your power. In holy splendour, from the womb before the dawn, I have begotten you.

The Lord has sworn an oath he will not change: 'You are a priest for ever, according to the order of Melchizedek.'

SECOND READING

1 Corinthians 11:23-26

Brothers and Sisters: I received from the Lord what I also delivered to you; that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it, and said, 'This is my body, which is for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' In the same way also he took the cup, after supper, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.' For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

SEQUENCE

Praise, O Sion, praise your Saviour, praise your captain and your pastor, with hymns and solemn songs.

Perform what pow'r affords indeed; his worth all praises far exceed, none can reach his dignity.

A special theme of praise is read, a living and life-giving bread, on this day exhibited.

Which in the supper of our Lord, to twelve disciples at his board no doubt was delivered.

Let our praise be loud and free, full of joy and decent glee, with minds' and voices' melody.

> For now solemnise we that day, which with joy does to us display the prince of this mystery.

At this board of our new Ruler, of new law, new Paschal order abolishes the ancient rite.

Old decrees be new annulled, shadows are in truths fulfilled, day finishes darkness.

That at supper Christ performed, to be done he rightly charged for his eternal memory.

Guided by his sacred orders, bread and wine upon our altars to saving host we sanctify.

Christians are by faith assured that to flesh the bread is changed, the wine to blood most precious.

That no wit nor sense conceives, firm and grounded faith believes, in strange effects not curious. Under kinds two in appearance, two in show but one in substance, lie things beyond comparison.

> Flesh is meat, blood drink most heav'nly, yet is Christ in each kind wholly, most free from all division.

None that consumes him does rend him, none that takes him does divide him: received, he whole perseveres.

> Be there one or thousands hosted. one as much as all received, he by no eating perishes.

Both the good and bad receive him, but effects are diverse in them, true life or true destruction.

> Life to the good, death to the wicked, mark how both alike received with far unlike conclusion.

When now the priest the host divides, know that in each part abides all the whole host covered.

> Form of bread not Christ is broken, not of Christ, but of his token, is state or stature altered.

Angels' bread made pilgrims' feeding truly bread for children's eating, to dogs not to be offered.

> Signed by Isaac on the altar, by the lamb and paschal supper, and in the manna figured.

Jesu, food and feeder of us, here with mercy feed and friend us, then grant in heaven felicity.

> Lord of all, who here do feed us, heav'nly guests, heirs, fellows make us, in eternal company. Amen. Alleluia.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia.

I am the living bread that came down from heaven, says the Lord. If anyone eats of this bread, he will live for ever. Alleluia.

GOSPEL

Luke 9: 11b-17 At that time: Jesus spoke to the crowd of the kingdom of God and cured those who needed healing. Now the day began to wear away, and the Twelve came and said to him, 'Send the crowd away to go into the surrounding villages and countryside to find lodging and get provisions, for we are here in a desolate place.' But he said to them, 'You give them something to eat.' They said, 'We have no more than five loaves and two fish — unless we are to go and buy food for all these people.' For there were about five thousand men. And he said to his disciples, 'Make them sit down in groups of about fifty each.' And they did so, and made them all sit down. And taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven and said a blessing over them. Then he broke the loaves and gave them to the disciples to set before the crowd. And they all ate and were satisfied. And what was left over was picked up, twelve baskets of broken pieces.
